SPC Part of 9 HBCUs Awarded \$1.5 Million Grant

St. Philip's College (SPC) is the receipt of an award of \$200,000 in scholarships from Greater Texas Services in support of students at Texas HBCUs. \$1.5 million scholarship funds support student retention and graduation at nine Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) across Texas: Prairie View A&M University, Texas Southern University (Houston), Huston-Tillotson University (Austin), Jarvis Christian College (Hawkins), Paul Quinn College (Dallas), Southwestern Christian College (Terrell), Texas College (Tyler) and Wiley College (Marshall).
