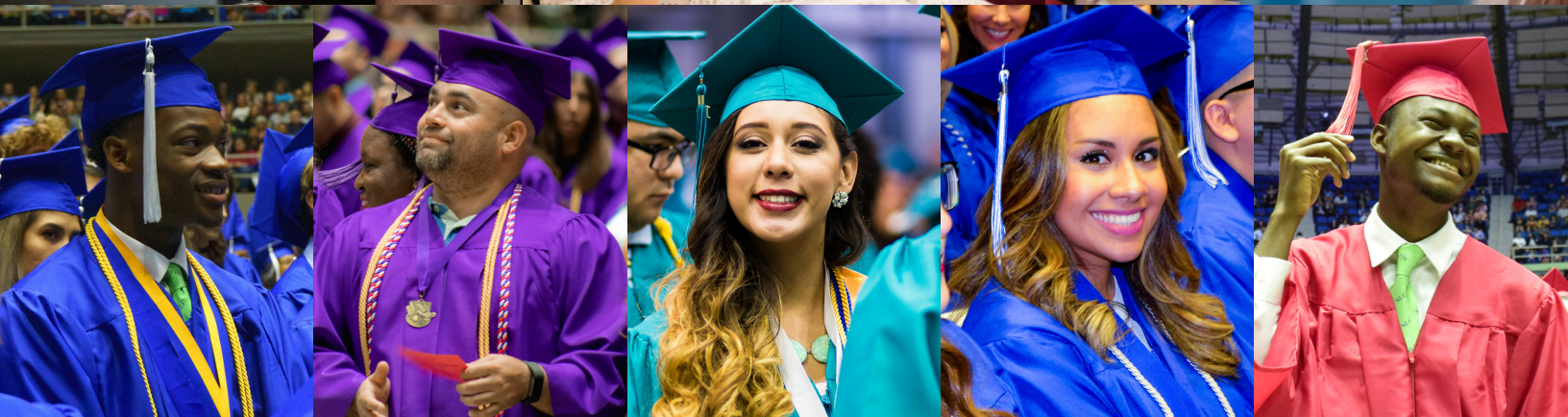

WHAT IS EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING?

Experiential learning provides a real-world understanding that enhances academic success. It is the process of learning through experience, where students are actively involved in the experience, reflect on the activity, and apply the value of the experience to broader areas of life. Self-reflection empowers students to take charge of their own learning and make connections to launch their career journey.



FOUR CATEGORIES OF EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

1

Co-Curricular

Activities related to course curriculum

Examples: Classroom-based learning projects, public speakers, panel discussions, research projects, and faculty-led study abroad

2

Extracurricular

Activities that foster student involvement and strengthen the culture of the institution.

Examples: Student clubs and organizations, sports, student leadership, and study abroad

3

Field Experience

Hands-on workplace learning that directly relates to career application

Examples: Apprenticeships, internships, community/private sector work study, clinicals, field observations, and student teaching

4

Service Learning

Activities that combine learning objectives, teach civic responsibility, and meet the community's needs

Examples: Volunteering with college advocacy centers, San Antonio Food Bank, Habitat for Humanity, and other non-profit organizations

THE AlamoEXPERIENCE MODEL

Partners with employers to ensure every student connects to an experiential learning experience, to provide students with the opportunity to explore career choices and develop relevant connections in their chosen industry.

Allows students to explore opportunities, capture their work, and connect with employers while building their résumés with the Experience Transcript.

THE EXPERIENCE TRANSCRIPT

THE EXPERIENCE TRANSCRIPT

A verified record, documenting student's engagement, to include experiential learning experiences.

HOW TO ACCESS THE EXPERIENCE TRANSCRIPT

- Log into **ACES** and select **Student Tab**
- Scroll down and select **AlamoEXPERIENCE**
- Click the **Sign-in** button
- Click on your **Account Profile**
- Scroll down and select **Experience Transcript**
- Click **Print//View PDF**

AlamoEXPERIENCE Platform



Students can find experiential learning opportunities and capture their involvement using the AlamoEXPERIENCE platform. The AlamoEXPERIENCE platform is accessed in ACES (aces.alamo.edu) through the Student tab.

Faculty and staff also have access to the platform on the ACES Employee tab. Employees can view existing opportunities and even add new experiential learning opportunities to engage students across the Alamo Colleges District.

Experience Transcript

This transcript highlights the students' experiences in a document can inform students' resumes, or even downloaded and shared on job, internship, college transfer, and scholarship applications. To access your Experience Transcript:

HOW DO I KNOW IF AN ACTIVITY QUALIFIES AS EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING?

The goal of experiential learning is to provide opportunities to students to supplement their classroom learning, develop their skills and build connections for their future careers.

Experiential learning opportunities include co-curricular learning, extra-curricular activities, field experience and service learning/community service.

Below is a checklist to determine how to designate an activity as experiential learning.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING CHECKLIST

- 
 Connect with your campus Career Experience Team Lead and/or Certified Career Experience Navigator
- 
 Align each activity with one of the four experiential learning opportunities
- 
 Ensure activity allows student(s) to apply and demonstrate soft-skills such as teamwork, problem-solving, leadership, etc.
- 
 Provide opportunities for self-reflection to empower student to make academic and experience connections related to career pathway
- 
 Ensure each experience meets one or more of the [NACE competencies and Institutional Learning Outcomes \(ILO\)](#)
- 
 Record and share student attendance (name, banner ID) with Certified Career Experience Navigator to record in AlamoEXPERIENCE for credit on transcript

ORGANIZING AN EL EVENT?

FACULTY AND STAFF

If you are organizing an experiential learning event and would like students to get credit for the event, submit the employee-initiated form. This will allow students who attend and participate in the event to earn credit on their Experience Transcript.

EMPLOYEE-INITIATED FORMS

Submit the **Employee-Initiated Experiential Learning Form** and a roster from your event. We will ensure students are awarded credit on their Experience Transcript. See **page 8** for instructions on how to find your college-specific form.

Contact your **Career Experience Team Leader** to inquire about funding for sponsoring experiential learning projects or events.

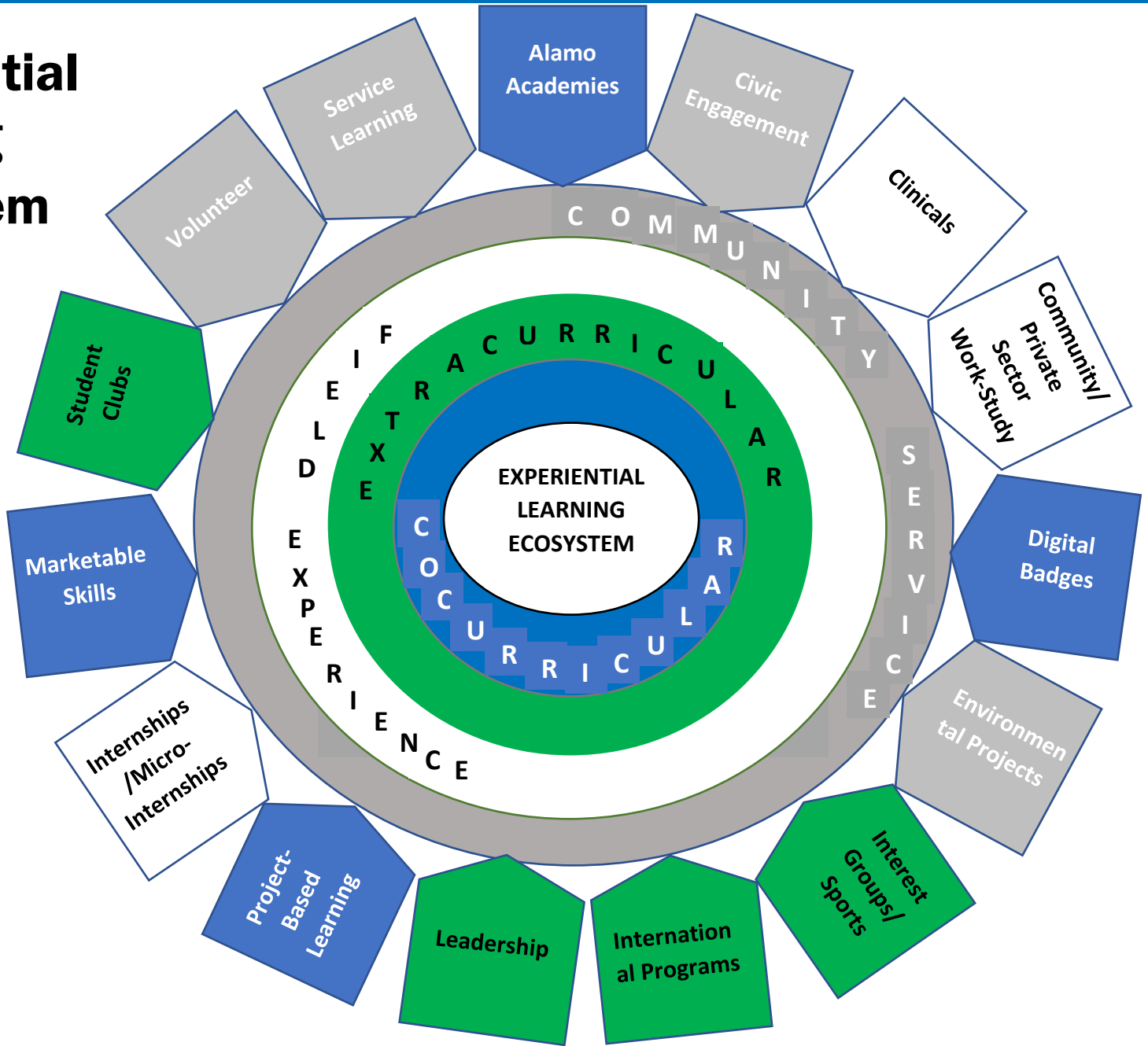

ALAMOEXPERIENCE MODEL DEFINITIONS AND FOUR TYPES LOGIC

The AlamoEXPERIENCE Experiential Learning Model Task Force, defines experiential learning as the development of new skills and/or perspectives gained through experience and personal reflection.

Participation in high-impact practices, including experiential learning, improve the quality of a student's experience, learning, retention, and success.

The Alamo Colleges District categorized experiential learning into four types of experiences:

- Co-curricular
- Service Learning/Community Services
- Extra-curricular activities
- Field Experience

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Every Experiential Learning (EL) experience will provide students the opportunity to:

- Engage in and reflect on structured, purposeful activities.
- Apply EL experience in a setting that may guide and inform their career pathway.
- Complete an EL experience by graduation, captured on an AlamoEXPERIENCE transcript.

Definitions of the Four Types of Experiential Learning Experiences

Co-curricular	Extra-curricular	Service Learning/ Community Service	Field Experience
<p>Activities that complement course curriculum, support the academic experience, and strengthen retention and completion.</p>	<p>Purposeful activities/events that foster student involvement, strengthen the culture of the institution, enhance the student engagement experience, and promote completion not connected to course curriculum.</p>	<p>A learning opportunity that integrates meaningful community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities.</p>	<p>The application of career competencies that allows for the development or enhancement of skills necessary for intended profession, with one week or more of extensive work experience.</p>

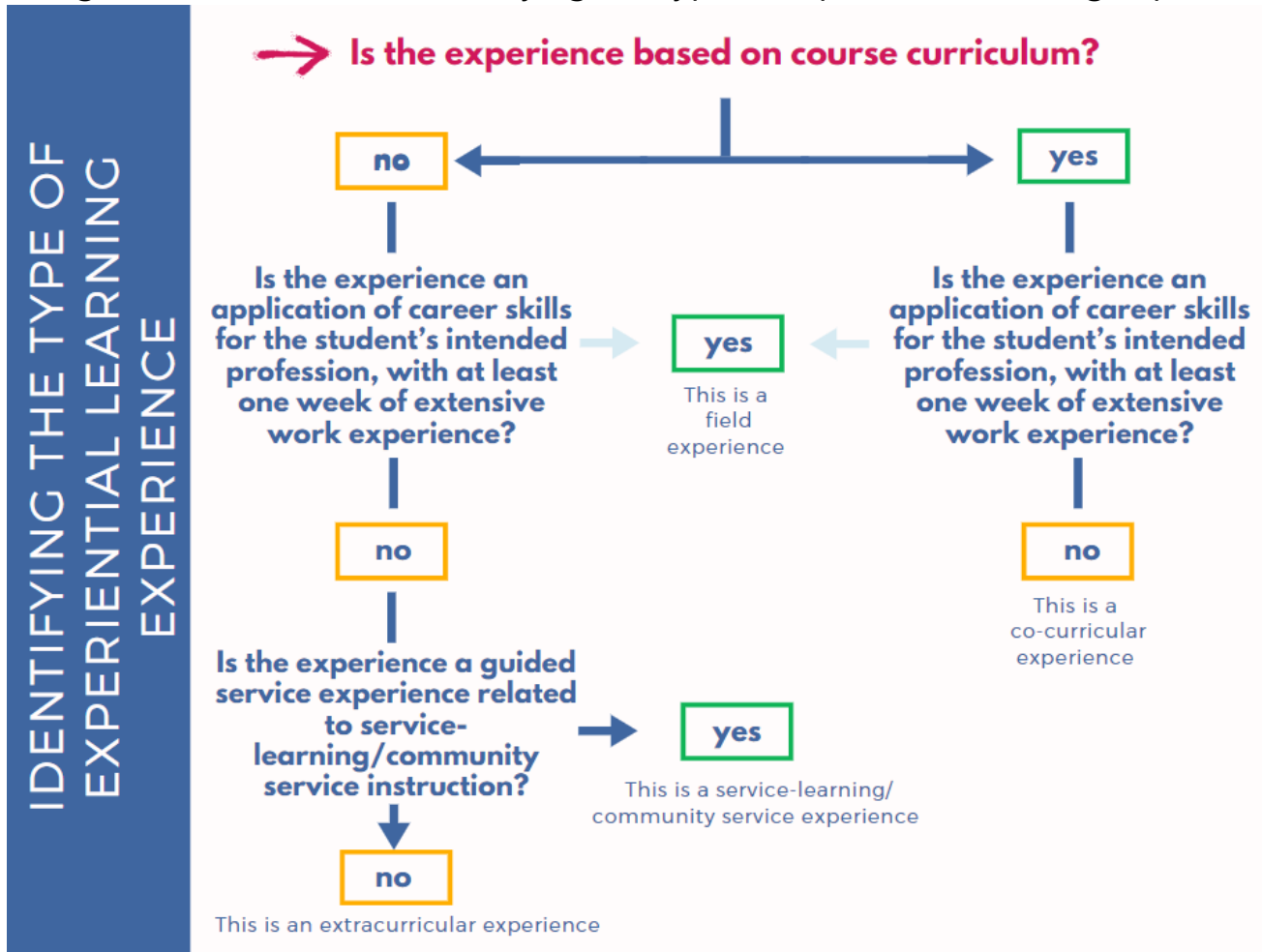

Additional Considerations

Study Abroad

- Faculty-led Study Abroad programs where students receiving academic credit for a course are classified as **Co-curricular**.
- Study Abroad experiences without academic credit are classified as **Extra-curricular**.

Study Abroad



Scenario of the Four Types of Experiences: Volunteering for Habitat for Humanity

Field Experience

- A student applying career skills developed in the Electrical Trades Level I Certificate program, by volunteering electrical systems work is classified as a **Field Experience**.

Field Experience

- A student volunteering as an [AmeriCorps long-term volunteer](#), applying the application of career skills, is classified as a **Field Experience**.

Service Learning/Community Service

- A student volunteering through the college Service Learning Center or independently, for a [build event](#), is classified as a **Service Learning/Community Service** as the experience integrates meaningful community service.

Co-curricular Learning

- A student volunteering for a [build event](#), as part of a course's curriculum assignment with a reflection component, is classified as a **Co-curricular**.

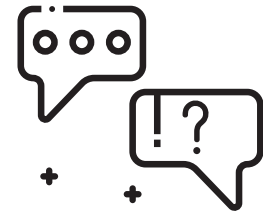
Extra-curricular Activities

- A student attending a guest speaker series, with a Habitat for Humanity representative, is classified as an **Extra-curricular** activity.
