St. Philip's College Celebrates Topping Out of Norris Technical Building

St. Philip's College held a ceremony to celebrate the raising of the last beam on an extensive renovation project. The Norris Technical Building was built in 1969. It was dedicated to honor Dr. Clarence W. Norris, Dean Emeritus, in 1975, and renovated in 1996. Trusse Norris, the youngest son of the late Dr. Norris, traveled from California to attend.

President's Message

We recently celebrated the raising of the final beam to mark the end of this phase of the Norris Technical Building renovation.

The building was constructed in 1969, expanded in 1972, and dedicated in honor of Dr. Clarence W. Norris, Dean Emeritus, in 1975.

Artemisia Bowden handpicked Dr. Norris in 1943 to be her successor. She sent him a letter, including, "I urge your prayerful consideration in this matter, for somehow, I feel that the future of the institution may be affected by your decision."

Dr. Norris joined the college as an administrator. When SPC joined San Antonio College to form a district, it became a branch campus and President Bowden accepted a demotion to dean. She was not allowed in the room where decisions about St. Philip's were made. When she retired, Dr. Norris was promoted to lead the college, but not as president – a title held only by the president of San Antonio College. Dr. Norris led as Dean of College from 1961 to 1969.

A president did not return to St. Philip's College until 1983.

In 1974, Dr. Norris stepped down as the head of the college and returned to teaching. He was a faculty member until his retirement and was named a Piper Professor in 1970 by the Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation.

In 1974, he was named Dean Emeritus. This month, Alamo Colleges District Board of Trustees will consider naming Dr. Norris President Emeritus. This will correct a historical wrong and give Dr. Norris the recognition he has earned for his leadership.



142nd Commencement Ceremony

St. Philip's College conferred 750 degrees and certificates during the Fall 2019 Commencement Ceremony. U.S. District Judge Jason Kenneth Pulliam served as the keynote speaker during the ceremony. Pulliam became the first African American to sit on the Texas Fourth Court of Appeals and is now the first African American to hold a bench on the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas.

The San Antonio Youth Wind Ensemble provided processional and recessional music for the evening. The posting of the colors was presented by the Sam Houston High School Junior ROTC Cadets, accompanied by the St. Philip's College Choir's performance of the United States National Anthem.

The evening featured Student Commencement Speaker,
Terrance Johnson who shared his journey to graduation including experiences with illness and homelessness. His story was so compelling that Judge Jason Pulliam announced his intent to pay Johnson's outstanding tuition. The exemplary student has since transferred to Texas A&M University -- Corpus Christi, where grants, scholarships and Pulliam's generous gift will see him through graduation debt free.
